### **Sex trade: Police to** work with hotels

HOTELS across Jersey are to be briefed by the States police as part of the force's work in tackling the trafficking of pros-titutes into the Island.

Meanwhile, it has also emerged that work is under way to rewrite Jersey's 100-year-old prostitution

law, which is leaving the force powerless to crack down on the sex trade.

The latest developments come after a JEP investigation revealed that more than 40 prostitutes are operating in Jersey,

with police fearing that some are being forced by criminal gangs to sell sex.

Since an intelligence tip-off in August, detectives have been examining claims that women, allegedly from Eastern Europe,

were being brought into the Island and then forced to work in the sex industry.

Today the States police said

## Islanders divided marria

ISLANDERS appear divided over whether same-sex marriages should be legalised, with 54 per cent of those who responded to a States consultation in favour of the

A total of 654 people out of the 1,213 who took part in the survey said they were in favour of gay marriage. A further 548 said that they were against the move.

A report accompanying the survey, which was launched after the States voted in favour of carrying out more research on gay marriage, said that the figures 'suggest that the

community is far from united on this issue.

However, Chief Minister Ian Gorst yesterday pledged that he would do everything in his powers to ensure that gay couples would be legally allowed to walk down the aisle by the end of 2017 at the latest. Currently they can enter only into civil partnerships.

After announcing the results at St Paul's Centre yesterday, Senator Gorst said: 'I know that for some members of our commu-nity, this is a very important day. It is also an important day for the community as a whole. (Cont from page 1) time that the changes to various pieces of legislation will take and the timescale is not out of kilter

with other jurisdictions.

'The consultation was about taking people on a journey, perhaps from where their long-held view or their faith view is, to a place where we're asking our-selves, does our legislation support all members of our commu-nity? So I'm not really surprised that the consultation numbers were as evenly matched as they

have been shown to be.'

He added: 'The consultation
was absolutely necessary because it is not just about the change, but how you get to that change. There are always going to be some people who think this is the wrong thing to do, so we have to find a middle ground which is as acceptable to as many members of the community as it can be.

The Senator also said that civil partnerships for gay couples could eventually be phased out,

and that his department was also looking at ways to improve the le-gal rights of co-habiting couples.

Meanwhile, rainbow flags will be flown from several prominent Island buildings as part of a camrights. The flag, often used as a symbol of gay pride, will be flown above Mont Orgueil castle, Elizabeth Castle, Fort Regent and Cyril Le Marquand House as part of 'Rainbow Mufti Day' which has been organised by gay rights charity Liberate.

### Amazon continue deliveries to Jersey

AMAZON has moved to reassure Islanders that they can still order goods, after dozens of customers were told that the internet giant no longer delivered to Jersey.

Over the last few days a number of concerned Islanders contacted the JEP having received messages from the company saying that their orders could not be delivered to the

Channel Islands.

However, the internet retailer has confirmed that there has been a glitch on their system that has been sending out the wrong

information to customers.

A spokesperson from the company said:
Amazon delivers items across the whole UK including the Channel Islands. Customers in the Channel Islands are seeing incorrect information regarding delivery eligibility on a small number of products. We are working to fix this.

The announcement comes ahead of tomorrow's so-called Black Friday, the huge global sales day that follows American Thanksgiving during which millions of

prices to encourage the start of Christmas shopping.

Amazon UK started offering Black Friday deals four years ago, following success in the US market.

Meanwhile, Jersey Post yesterday confirmed that it will continue to deliver packages from the company.

Jersey Post is aware that some Jersey resi-

dents are currently experiencing issues with

'At present, we continue to deliver on be-half of Amazon and, we believe, most compa-

nies who operate on their market place.'

The postal company added: 'Unfortunately, there are, and always will be, companies who do not want the perceived hassle of delivering to the Island. We are working hard with UK carriers to address this, and locally to pro-vide a greater range of packet and parcel delivery options to make the end to end process

were no obvious signs of concern for their safety or well-being. Today, in a statement States police said: 'As part of our con-tinuing work into the potential exploitation and trafficking of prostitutes in Jersey, the States of Jersey Police have received

intelligence about a number of premises across the Island, including a number of Island hotels, and as part of this development and understanding process, the force will be engaging with and briefing hotel management in the near future in order to ensure a joined-up approach to this work.'
